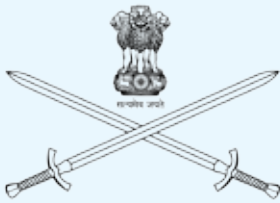

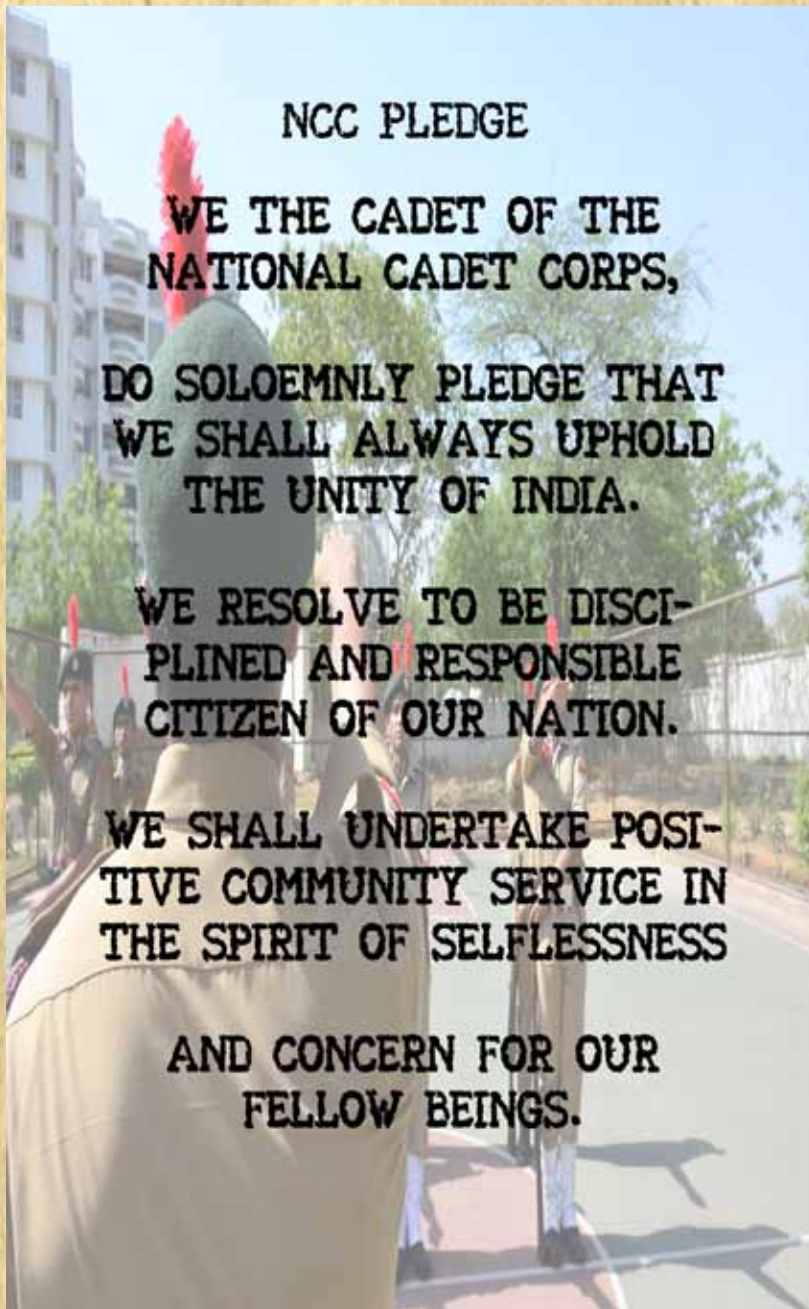

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WHAT IS THE YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAMME? NCC CADETS AS INDIAN AMBASSADORS

Youth Exchange Programme NCC is basically being an Indian goodwill ambassador during the visit to host country. Cadets are selected each year to visit foreign countries and interact with the student community and share our rich cultural heritage. Selected NCC cadets participate in Youth Exchange Programme which is a country to country exchange of cadets belonging to NCC/ equivalent Govt/ youth organizations of friendly countries. They participate in NCC activities of the host country to create an increased awareness and appreciation of each other's socio-economic and cultural realities. NCC has a vibrant YEP with 11 countries. The benefits of this programme have been widely acknowledged. Our cadets share a strong bond with our YEP partners. As of now more than 150 cadets proceed abroad on YEP annually.

Tests conducted during YEP competition :-

- (i) Written Test (150 Marks)
 - (ii) Drill (75 Marks)
 - (iii) Personality and Communication Skills (300 Marks)
 - (iv) DG Interview (100 Marks)
 - (v) Participation in RDC Events (50 Marks)
- (c) Training

Cadets are called to Delhi seven days prior to departure for completing VISA, immigration and calling on the DG, apart from other preliminary training under a launch camp

(d) Debriefing :- Cadets stay for three days after arrival for debriefing DG.

How to get selected?

As per the latest regulations, NCC cadets who have been selected for the Republic Day Camp in the second year of NCC in Senior Division/ Senior Wing are eligible to apply for Youth Exchange Programme. Cadets are selected for YEP during RDC selection camps, on the basis of their performance in drill, personality and communication test, general knowledge test, and various cultural activities. During the main camp, selected cadets are tested based on the same criteria and interviewed by the Director General NCC. Based on the result, a cadet is given a delegation.

Aims of Youth Exchange Programme -

To visit and participate in various NCC activities of the exchange country, and create among participants increased awareness, understanding and appreciation of each other's socio-economic and cultural realities.

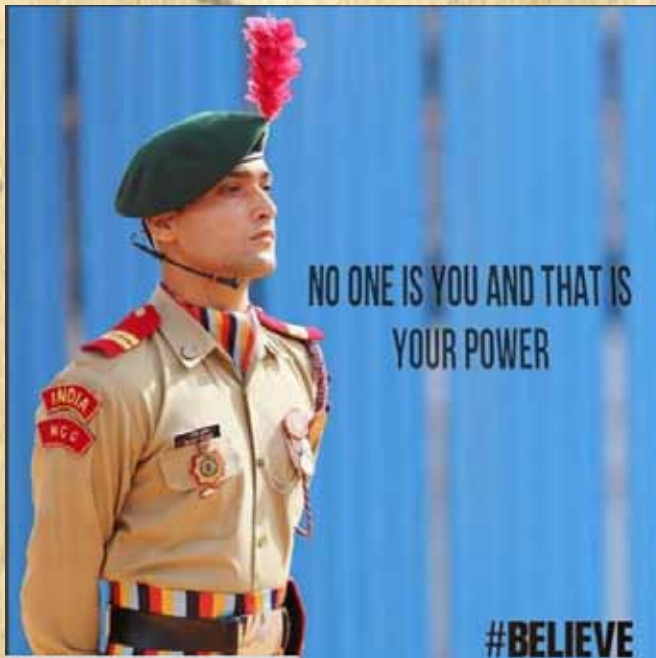
I wish to see an India where there is no discrimination, no corruption, an

NCC: LIFE AND OPPORTUNITIES

The National Cadet Corps being the largest youth organization in India imparts training to the cadets to develop them into men of high standards and values. It is but natural that the training imparted to the aspiring cadets is not as easy as it seems. Maintaining discipline as in the armed forces is not a leisure walk down the road. NCC not only trains the cadets to become a part of the armed forces but also imparts training to make leaders of tomorrow in their respective fields. The programme of NCC initiated by the Government is laudable and the various training activities introduced by the organization are worth the effort.

Institutional Training

The training is imparted to the cadets in their respective schools and colleges. This training is the core and all the basic knowledge is provided to the cadets in it. Drill, first aid, map reading, powered flying and weapon training are a part of the lessons provided to the cadets according to the different

Wings of NCC. The learning and performance of drill is the first step towards any training in the armed forces. The cadets are taught to march and salute with or without arms. The basic idea behind drill is to inculcate a sense of unity and discipline amongst the cadets while marching in tandem with each other. Weapon training is what cadets are always excited and anxious about. The joy and thrill of a student in his/her teens learning to use a real weapon and learning to dismantle and re-assemble the parts of the weapon is inexplicable. Learning to fire a gun is an experience of a lifetime.

Adventure Training

The National Cadet Corps ensures an opportunity galore for the cadets to participate in various adventure camps. While mountaineering, trekking and cycle/motor cycle expeditions are quite common, Paragliding and Parajumping are open for cadets who have the strength to face the dangers accompanying adventure. The cadets are also given the opportunities to go for Scuba Diving,

Yachting and Sailing expeditions. The adventure training inculcates a spirit of dedication and discipline in the cadets which is of great help in times of adversity on the battlefield or in daily life. It trains them to take crucial decisions instantly in any complex situations. It gives them the ability to be pro-active and not reactive. The adventure trainings are usually held in the wilderness or far from the urban cities. Cadets experience intimacy with Mother Nature and learn to respect our natural resources. They do not have to pay even a single rupee for experiencing the exciting and enchanting world of adventure.

Social Service and Community Development

- Cadets of the National Cadet Corps have played an important role in the spreading of messages for social causes and have contributed towards the community's development. The NCC cadets have been in the forefront in raising awareness amongst the people regarding the ill-effects of the tradition of child marriage

and dowry. They staunchly support education (including adult education) for all and have helped the Government in spreading the message of the benefits of education to individuals and the country as a whole. Afforestation is another cause that the cadets work for. The cadets take part in the blood donation camps enthusiastically. They have also been ever ready to campaign for pulse polio programmes and have lent a helping hand to lepers and helped them join the mainstream rather than being confined in their shanty colonies. The cadets are taught to respect and give back to the society. The traditional values of communal harmony are high on the agenda of NCC. The cadets are also provided training in Disaster Management. - Every country needs to understand the culture and tradition of its

fellow countries to work towards global peace and harmony. Some of the best cadets are chosen every year and sent to various countries under Youth Exchange Programmes to see the world and communicate with their counterparts. Cadets from other countries are also invited to India under YEP. This also gives the cadets an opportunity to explore new countries. Various cadets from different countries coming together under one roof is a leap towards international peace and harmony. It is also a small step towards joint military exercises that help the countries to share information and technology to counter terrorism. The qualities of dedication, determination, love and respect for one's country, leadership and social service are imparted to cadets of NCC.



It is only the cadets that have the privilege to get acquainted with the real life of the armed forces and live like them. Cadets are taught to respect each others' religion and keep communal

tensions at bay. The organization instills the feeling of Nationalism in its cadets and propagates the idea of being an Indian before being anyone else. Being a part of NCC

has also been popular with cadets due to its recognition in every industry in India. The privilege of being given a priority in various departments like armed forces, Para-military forces

and universities is an added incentive. It is high time that people realize that unlike the old days when the Armed Forces were considered to be more popular among the poor or, They are

rising in popularity charts and one can even see engineers and doctors opting to join the ranks.

Job Opportunities at NCC

The NCC is a responsive, learning and continuously evolving organization. Its activity is guided by certain core values that are essential to instill among all ranks of the NCC. The NCC aims at developing character, comradeship, discipline and a secular outlook, the spirit of adventure and ideals of selfless service among young citizens. Further, it aims at creating a pool of organized, trained and motivated youth with leadership qualities in all walks of life, who will serve the Nation regardless of which career they choose. Needless to say, the NCC also provides an environment conducive to motivating young Indians to join the armed forces. For many people NCC is nothing but a bunch of students' aspiring to join Indian Army wearing Khaki pants and enjoying free

Government ration for 10 days. But to be honest, it's nothing like that. The main intention of NCC was to introduce the youth of our nation to the Defense Sector and motivate them to experience and join this noble cause, but with course of time, many events added up in the NCC, and now it is an optional subject in some schools. NCC provides A, B and C certificates. These certificates indicate your proficiency in some subjects that they teach while you are a member of the NCC and are awarded after you have written some tests and also executed some tasks set for yourself. 'A' certificate is awarded only to Junior Division cadets when he/she is a student of a school. 'B' and 'C' certificates are awarded to senior division cadets. To appear for 'B'; it is not necessary to have

passed 'A'. However, to appear for 'C', you should have passed 'B' certificate. As Regular officers in Indian Army, 32 vacancies are reserved for NCC 'C' Certificate holders for every course, i.e. 64 seats each year irrespective of merit in SSB. As Short Service Commissioned Officers in the Indian Army, the NCC 'C' Certificate holders are exempted from appearing in written Examination (UPSC exam). 50 vacancies are reserved in each course i.e. 100 seats for each year. As Regular Officers in Indian Navy, six vacancies are reserved in each course i.e. 12 seats per year for NCC 'C' Certificate (Naval Wing) holders. They must have passed B.Sc. (Physics and Maths) or BE, are of at least 19 to 24 years of age, and are deemed fit to undergo training in Naval

Academy, Goa by the Services Selection Board (SSB). Such candidates are exempted from appearing in the CDS Examination conducted by UPSC. 10% of all available seats are reserved for NCC C; Certificate (Air Wing) holders including Pilot courses. if you opt for Regular Officers in Indian Air Force. They need not to appear for UPSC Examination. An additional of 2, 4, 6 and 10 marks are given to 'A' Certificate only, B certificate and C certificate respectively for joining Border Security Force. For joining as Officers (Company Commanders, Quartermasters and Dy SPs), the minimum prescribed qualification is a Second class Bachelors Degree. However, NCC 'B' OR 'C' Certificate holders having a Third Class Bachelors Degree are also

considered eligible. As for joining Central Industrial Security Force, a student needs to have additional marks at the scale of One mark for 'B' Certificate holders and Three marks for 'C' Certificate holders, are given to candidates in the rank of 'Constable' Additional weightage between 03 and 10 is given to candidates for joining in both Officer Cadre as well as Enrolled personnel for joining Coast Guard. NCC Cadets are also taken on cruise on board as and when Coast Guard ship visits neighbouring countries. NCC develops the cadets holistically, making them suitable to enter into Defence.



Officer Like Qualities (OLQs)

To enter into the eminent Indian Armed Forces, one must possess Officer Like Qualities (OLQs). The way one reacts to things, how one plans the day, the choices made, ways in which one leads his life, collectively furnish one's personality. Every person has varied qualities. But to become an officer in the defence forces, an aspirant must possess some relevant qualities. A candidate while selection, is tested by the psychologist, GTD (Group Testing Officer) and the interviewing officers on the basis of 15 qualities as listed below. A candidate must have all of these qualities to be deemed suitable for defence services. The OLQs are specified below.

1. EFFECTIVE INTELLIGENCE:

This explains how one utilizes his intelligence in different situations to have productive outcomes. One must think of the simplest but the best way to deal with everyday problems. Slowly and gradually, a person will find that he is thinking in the right direction and useful results are coming.

2. REASONING ABILITY:

Reasoning skills are essential for day-to-day life: we

use them to make choices among possible options, to distinguish between positive and negative situations, to decide how to approach a problem and resolve it, and much more. To improve reasoning ability one must read the opinion page of a newspaper, listen to the debaters and engage in conversation with learned and erudite people.

3. ORGANIZING ABILITY:

It refers to the ability of putting things in the right place and deriving maximum benefits out of it. One can develop organizing skills by being a part of organizing team in the events of schools, colleges and work places.

4. POWER OF EXPRESSION:

Expressions are a part and parcel of every human being on this earth. Every person has the right to express himself. It is only through expressions that one can achieve harmony between the physical exterior and the mental core. It is a way of giving life to your thoughts and feelings. The act of expressing your views is an art which varies from person to person but you get to learn this when you reach out to talk to people.

5. SOCIAL ADAPTABILITY:

Social adaptation refers to adjustment of humans to other individuals and community groups working together for a common purpose.

6. COOPERATION:

Cooperation is the process of groups of organisms working or acting together for a common or a mutual benefit, as opposed to working in competition for selfish benefit. This quality can be difficult to improve in one's self because a person has to subdue his ego and concur with his team members to arrive at a solution. It is advisable to work selflessly towards the completion of the objective of the team without worrying about getting acknowledged for the work done.

7. SENSE OF RESPONSIBILITY:

It is a comprehensive understanding of one's duties and obligations. It means giving full dedication to the task one has to perform. One should never run away from the problems. Rather, should face it and find solutions for it.

8. INITIATIVE:

It refers to an introductory act or step or leading action. It is very important to take an initiative to work under unfamiliar situations and to put a sustained and long lasting effort to accomplish the goal. It is important to be the first one to take up new tasks and

projects with zeal.

9. SELF CONFIDENCE:

Self-confidence relates to self-assurance in one's personal judgement, ability, power, etc. Self-confident people are admired by others and inspire confidence in others. They face their fears head-on and tend to be risk takers. This is where posture, smiling, eye contact and speech slowly come into play. Just the simple act of pulling your shoulders back give others the impression that you are a confident person. Smiling will not only make you feel better but will make others feel more comfortable around you.

10. It is the ability to come up with viable and feasible ideas without taking much time. People with a wavering mind set have difficulties in making correct decisions. One must have the required information and should apply their thinking skills to reach to the destination.

11. It refers to the establishing of a clear vision, sharing that vision with others so that they will follow willingly, providing the information, knowledge and methods to realize that vision and coordinating and balancing the conflicting interests of all members in a group.

12. People who are full of positive energy are characterized by much activity or ex-

citement are referred to be lively. It is very important to enjoy what you do and deal with situations not as problems, but opportunities.

13. Determination is a positive emotional feeling that involves persevering towards a difficult goal in spite of obstacles. Determination occurs prior to goal attainment and serves to motivate behaviour that will help achieve one's goal.

14. It refers to the propensity to take risks. Courage is the choice and willingness to confront agony, pain, danger, uncertainty or intimidation. One must do the things one fears from and constantly be motivated to do something new.

15. The ability of an organism to exert itself and remain active for a long period of time, as well as its ability to resist, withstand, recover from and have immunity to trauma, wounds or fatigue. It is advisable to stretch your limits and to get out of comfort level. It is said, "The more you sweat in practice, the lesser you bleed in war."



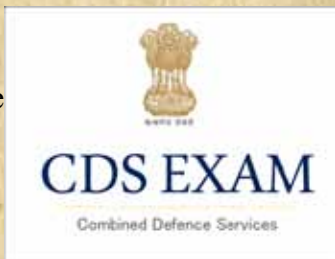
How to crack Combined Defense Services (CDS) Exam

An officer in the Indian Army inherits glorious heritage and timeless traditions, blended perfectly with the latest technology in the fields of management, engineering and medical sciences. It offers a golden opportunity to be a part of the world's finest Army and get trained not only to be an Officer but also a Gentleman for life.

In this article I will try to provide some valuable tips on how to clear the CDS exam conducted by UPSC. Many aspirants tend to miss out on the fundamentals, which leads them to failure. Some very simple yet effective points here will set you up on the road to success.

I cleared the CDS exam (I) conducted in February 2017. It was Scheduled on 5th February 2017, just 5 days after the Republic Day Camp ended, in which I had participated. The activities in the camp always kept the cadets on their toes, and it was nearly impossible to take time out for any preparation. Yet against all odds, after a regular reading of the newspaper, and just five days of preparation, I managed to make it to the merit list of the UPSC entry for the SSC 107th course at Officer's Training Academy, Chennai. The above makes one thing clear - with the right approach and a smart preparation, it is very easy to clear the CDS exam. Don't fall into the illusion that its near impossible to clear because over 8000

candidates pass the exam twice every year. Here is what I did during my preparations.
1) Study from as few sources as possible - My only source of study for this exam was a guide book for CDS exam (by Khurana Publishing House, However, I recommend Pathfinder CDS by Arihant publications), and the Hindu newspaper. I had picked up the former only four days before the exam, however, the latter was studied over the past six months. The reason for choosing only few sources is that it makes you very clear on your topics, avoids confusion and saves a lot of time and money. Try it.
2) Start Early - I managed to clear the exam in four days, but it does not mean that this exam



is very easy to clear. If I had the opportunity I would have started a thorough preparation six months before the exam. Thanks to my good memory of all the GK I had learnt in school as well as the regular reading of newspaper that I could score well in the English and GK sections. If you are weak in them, you must start early. That brings me to my next point.
3) Brush up on your weak points, especially Mathematics - Most of us are die-hard fanatics of the Indian Military Academy. Most of us are also terrible at Mathematics. If you are one of them, You must start working on this weakness right away. Maths is a very scoring part

of the CDS exam, and unless you are opting for OTA (SSC), you will have to study it and score well in order to succeed. A regular practice of math problems in NCERT books from classes VI-X for at least three months shall prepare you enough to crack the exam. If your english and general knowledge is weak, I would suggest reading a lot of newspaper.
4) Guide Books save time - The guide books I mentioned earlier are prepared after a lot of research. They concisely put all the topics that are generally tested under one cover. So do not waste time studying a lot of NCERTs or GK books. The Guide book has almost everything you need in order to clear the exam. Make sure that you complete reading

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your book at least twice before the day of the exam.
5) Go through the previous year question papers - This was a last minute savior for me. A cursory glance at the question papers of the last three years was sufficient for me to get an idea of what kind of questions will be asked. This was tremendously useful in planning my approach for the exam.
So that's all. These five points were very useful for me in clearing the exam, and if you believe in yourself, stay focused and approach the exam with dedication, I am sure you will clear it. All the best for the exam and the SSB! Jai Hind.

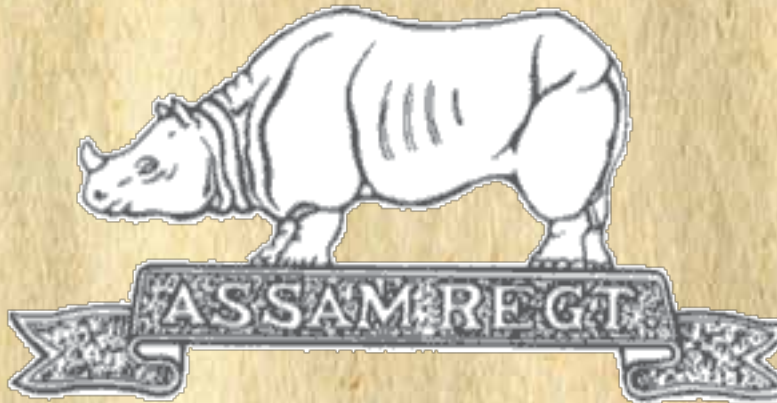

Assam Regiment and the Legend of Badluram Ka Badan

“Tagra Raho” is the unique regimental slogan/ salutation that was adopted in the 1960s when the then commanding officer late Maj. Gen. S C Barbora would ask his sainiks “Tagra Ho?” (are you strong/fit?) to which the sainiks would respond “Tagra hai sir”. This is but one of the many interesting traditions associated with this highly decorated Assam Regiment.

Even more fascinating is the legend of soldier ‘Badluram’ and story of how the regimental song/ march “Badluram Ka Badan” came to be adopted.

“Badluram ka badan Zamin ke neeche hai....aur humko uska ration milta hai...” (Badluram’s body is buried but we draw his ration) goes the regimental song. The legend of the song is based in a true story:

Badluram was a soldier who died in the ‘Japan War’ (World War II). His Quarter Master was apparently ‘smart’ and continued to draw rations on the jawan’s name.

The surplus ration that collected in the name of Badluram over the months proved to be a godsend when the regiment was surrounded by the Japanese and cut off from supplies. The regiment survived the siege thanks to Badluram’s ration and averted a possibly disastrous fate that could have resulted in many deaths goes the story.

So Badluram, his badan and his ration are now a part of regimental tradition and lore. Every passing out ceremony – Kasam Parade – of young recruits at Happy Valley in Shillong features a rousing, inspiring rendition of Badluram ka Badan; a thoroughly enjoyable and morale uplifting performance. It is a wonderful way for the Rhinos (the Assam one horned rhino is the regiment mascot) to rejoice and celebrate their sense of pride, belonging and camaraderie.
